You are invited to take part in this research project, which aims to explore and define current and potential roles of individuals in interprofessional collaborative practice in primary care to effectively manage complex and/or long-term medical conditions. The study will explore the experiences and roles of individuals in their team care.

What is the purpose of this research?

The project is intended to explore the experiences of individuals with complex or long-term medical conditions in their team care. We are interested in your opinions of how patients may experience and what their role is in team care in primary care settings. The outcome of this study is to develop a framework to inform collaborative team care.

Why have I been invited to participate?

You have been invited to participate because you are a member of a patient advocacy or advisory group that represents patients with a long-term medical condition or patients in primary health care in Australia.

What does participation in this research involve?

You and other members of the advocacy or advisory group will be invited to a focus group discussion led by Alexandra Davidson, supported by another member of the research team. If Government regulations are in place to limit to essential travel only, then we will discuss using technology, telephone or videoconference for your focus group.

The focus group will last for about one hour to 90minutes and will be audio recorded, and the transcripts will be used in data analysis. Questions in this focus group will be about your personal and professional opinions of team care in primary healthcare settings and the role patients may play.

Participation in this research project is voluntary.
