HISTORY OF THE ASTHMA FOUNDATIONS IN AUSTRALIA

FOREWORD

August, 1965

The story of the formation and growth of the Asthma Foundation in Australia is an exciting one. The concept of the formation of an Asthma Foundation is less than four years old and yet here in Australia today there are no less than six Asthma Foundations, co-ordinated by, and under the supervision of, a Federal Council. The rapid growth of the Foundation is quite spectacular, and it can be said with confidence that it is the only charity in Australia which has reached Commonwealth status, with a Foundation in every State, in less than four years -- with the possible exception of the National Heart Foundation.

Why has this been so? Undoubtedly it is due to a large extent to the dedication, the drive and the energy of those who initiated the first Asthma Foundation in 1961. However, despite this driving force, such spectacular results could not have been achieved had it not been for the will of the people. In every State when the call went out to some dedicated person to take the initial steps for the formation of a Foundation, the people responded, people of standing in the community, in the academic, industrial and social fields, came forward to play an important part in the establishment of a Foundation in their State.

Funds have been, or are being, raised throughout Australia in the name of the asthma sufferer, and those funds are now being used in an effort to alleviate the distress of asthma sufferers, to carry out research into the causes and treatment of asthma, in educating the medical and non-medical people in their attitude towards asthma, but above all in giving to the asthma sufferer a ray of hope -- the hope that one day Australia may give to the world a cure for asthma.

The story of the beginning and the growth of the Asthma Foundation is set out below.

NEW SOUTH WALES

In 1959 two mothers met for the first time, Mrs. Arthur Schmidt of Lindfield and Mrs. Max Halliday of Cremorne. These mothers found they had something in common -- they were mothers of an asthmatic child. They had both come to the realization that no matter what they did, no matter where they went, no matter what help they sought, they had to face the horrible fact that their children must be conditioned to living a life of acceptance, and facing the problem that nothing really could be done to cure the disease; they could only be helped and assisted towards being educated to live with it and adjust their lives accordingly. Neither mother was prepared to accept the statement that her child looked forward to a future controlled and conditioned by the fact that he/she was an asthma sufferer, whose future sporting life, social life, emotional life and physical life would be restricted.

These two mothers joined forces and set about investigating the possibility of forming an organisation dedicated to the belief that something should be done for the relief of asthma sufferers. Their original idea was that, if they could get sufficient people together and form a society, they could raise money to carry out research into the causes and treatment of asthma. With this thought they approached the two main medical research foundations in New South Wales at that time and offered to raise the money, if there was a guarantee that the money would be used for investigation into asthma. After many months of fruitless effort and time lost in interview after interview, these two women had to face the fact that no such guarantee was forthcoming.

It was then that they began to look around amongst their own friends and amongst influential men and women in Sydney who could possibly have thoughts similar to their own, and from then on real and dramatic progress was made. Those who helped in the initial stages will be remembered by these mothers forever; they were Dr. Bernard Riley, a man well-known in the field of asthma in Australia; the Honourable Mr. Justice Hardie, himself an asthma sufferer for twenty years; and Mr. Herc McIntyre, who was later Chairman of the Asthma Appeal conducted in New South Wales in 1962/63. With the initial support of these men, the Asthma Foundation came into being and men and women of consequence in the community joined forces and formed the Board and Council of the first Asthma Foundation in Australia - and, it is thought, in the world.

This was done in January, 1962; shortly after, office space within the city, and furniture, typewriters and other equipment were acquired on loan and without any charge. This office was manned by Mrs. Schmidt and Mrs. Halliday and other voluntary workers. Shortly after the office was opened, the President of the Foundation, Mr. Justice Hardie, gave an interview to the press on the Foundation's aims and objectives and it was then that the miracle began to happen. Men and women from all over Sydney, from all over New South Wales, from all over Australia, began calling and writing, saying one thing over and over again - "God bless you for what you are doing".... "Thank God something has been done at last for the asthma sufferer"..... "We now have hope for the future" ... and "What, pray, can we - the people - do to help?"

It was an inspiration to those associated with the Foundation and before they had time to formulate any concrete plans, before any real foundation stones had been laid, and literally without a penny piece behind them, the people of New South Wales catapulted, literally catapulted, the Asthma Foundation into a public appeal for funds.

In April 1962 a Charity Premiere was held at the Tivoli Theatre from which the sum of £1,500 nett was raised. With this "kitty" the Asthma Foundation launched a public appeal for a quarter of a million pounds (£250,000) less than six months after its establishment. In March 1963 the Asthma Appeal closed, having raised the total of £247,000. Because of a handful of dedicated people who inspired and encouraged others, the costing of the Asthma Appeal was extremely low, the nett sum raised being £221,000. The response from the people of New South Wales was truly magnificent, particularly in light of the fact that the Asthma Appeal was conducted concurrently with the National Freedom from Hunger Campaign.

The message given to the people of New South Wales during the Asthma Appeal was that the money was being raised "for research into the causes, treatment and cure of asthma and allied conditions, and the establishment of Clinics for the treatment and rehabilitation of asthmatics". The message continued:- "Our objects are, firstly, to establish a comprehensive and productive research programme and, secondly, to investigate the possibility of establishing Clinics where specialists may make their services readily available to asthma sufferers and their doctors".

By the end of 1963, the first steps had been taken to honour the first pledge, and by the end of 1964 three Research Fellowships had been established, within the Department of Medicine, New South Wales University; The Department of Medicine, University of Sydney; and the Page Chest Pavilion at the Royal Prince Alfred Hospital.

Five Grants-in-Aid had also been made to the Universities of Sydney and of New South Wales, to the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Centre, and to the N.S.W. Society for Crippled Children to support what is known today as the Margaret Reid Asthma Project. A sum of over £43,000 has been allocated to establish and maintain these various Research Fellowships and Grants-in-Aid, which cover a period of up to 1967.

One of the most interesting ventures undertaken by the Asthma Foundation in New South Wales is the Margaret Reid Asthma Project which is under the joint control and supervision of the N.S.W. Society for Crippled Children and the Foundation. This project covers an investigation into the problem of asthma affecting children between the ages of seven and twelve years. These children are admitted to the project for long-term treatment at the Margaret Reid Hospital at St. Ives. This study is a pilot one and as yet no definite results have been made available. Within this project, two assistant Research Fellows are working under the direction of the Chief Investigator.

The balance sheet for the year ended 30th June 1965 showed an accumulated fund of £218,835. This strong financial position is due to the vigilance of an active and dedicated President, a competent active Finance Committee, the financial support of a number of citizens of standing, continued contributions from large commercial and industrial organisations, and from the fund-raising activities of its Women's Committee, which has continued to set up Auxiliaries throughout the state. These Auxiliaries, headed by dedicated women who have served the Foundation since its inception, are responsible for a steady flow of funds into the coffers of the Foundation. At present there are eight Auxiliaries working at full strength and bringing in an average of £400 each per year. Moves are afoot to establish three further Auxiliaries within the next six months and this pattern will probably continue in the years to come.

The N.S.W. Foundation has been fortunate to be named as a beneficiary in several wills over the past year; some legacies have been small, but others are for really large sums. One legacy will bring the Foundation in the vicinity of £10,000 and another from £25,000 to £30,000. The Foundation will probably use these legacies for specific purposes and the President is at present investigating what purposes or projects would be both practicable and of real benefit to asthma sufferers.

The N.S.W. Foundation was fortunate that its President, the Honourable Mr. Justice Hardie, was able to represent it and the Federal Council of the Asthma Foundations in Australia at the first World Asthma Conference held in Eastbourne, England, in March 1965. As a result of meeting and hearing experts from all over the world discuss the problem of asthma, Mr. Justice Hardie was able to get a most comprehensive picture of what is being done throughout the world today in this field. The knowledge so gained has proved, and will prove, to be of great assistance in the work ahead of the Foundations in Australia. It is interesting to note that, as a result of attending this Conference, the President discovered that here in Australia today work is being done into the investigation of asthma on a more intensive scale than in most other countries in the world today. He also noted that in New South Wales more money had been raised and more money is being applied to investigation into asthma than in the United Kingdom.

ASTHMA WELFARE SOCIETY

One very important part of the work in New South Wales is that being done through the Asthma Welfare Society. This Society is subsidised by the Foundation and works within the framework of, and subject to the general supervision of, the Foundation. It is mainly concerned with welfare work amongst asthma sufferers and is responsible for bringing out a booklet "The Welfarer" on a quarterly basis, which presents the problem of asthma to the people in laymen's language. The Society was formed in May 1962. Mrs. Schmidt, then a member of the Board of the Foundation, was appointed as the Honorary Director of the Society, which position was held by her until several months ago.

As the Society grew in membership, so its interest and activities expanded. One of its most interesting projects is the swimming classes for asthmatic children. These classes are held throughout the year - in winter in heated pools. Children from all over the metropolitan area are coming to these classes and are being taught how to breathe correctly and how to exercise, in an effort to relieve their asthma. This project is proving most successful and the numbers of enrolments are increasing daily. Mothers are bringing children from many miles twice a week to attend these classes, and it is hoped that through this medium relief will be brought to many asthmatic children.

WOLLONGONG BRANCH

During the Asthma Appeal, a most active Committee was formed in Wollongong under the presidency of Mr. Mont P. Sheppard; whose committee succeeded in raising the sum of \$14,000 during the Asthma Appeal. At the close of the Appeal it was decided to set up a Branch of the Foundation in Wollongong; this Branch is functioning under the Presidency of Mr. Mont P. Sheppard and is doing splendid work in promoting the aims and objectives of the Foundation and keeping the problem of asthma before the people of Wollongong. The branch has recently undertaken financial responsibility for supplying Spirometers to the two main hospitals in the area, the Wollongong Base Hospital and the Port Kembla Hospital.

NEWCASTLE AREA

In the Newcastle area there are two active Auxiliaries of the Foundation. One is in the Lake Macquarie area and the other in Newcastle itself. Recently the Newcastle Committee assumed the responsibility for raising funds to supply Spirometers to the two large hospitals in Newcastle, the Royal Newcastle Hospital and the Mater Misericordiae Hospital, to assist in their work with asthmatics.

VICTORIA

In May 1962 an approach was made to Mrs. Govan Cox of Melbourne by Mrs. Halliday (of the N.S.W. Foundation) asking her if she would assume responsibility for taking the initial steps for the formation of an Asthma Foundation in Victoria. Mrs. Cox, with no particular interest in the problem of asthma at that time, willingly undertook the task.

After several months of initial investigation, Mrs. Cox called on Dr. Vincent Bristow, and gave him the information and material that she had received from Mrs. Halliday, which Dr. Bristow presented to a meeting of the Society of Allergists in Adelaide in August 1962.

At the invitation of Mr. Justice Hardie and Mrs. Halliday, and following further discussions with Mrs. Cox, Doctors Bristow and Paul Ward Farmer came to Sydney for talks about the establishment of the Asthma Foundation in Victoria.

This visit took place in October 1962. In September 1962, Mrs. June Campbell, now Honorary Secretary of the Asthma Foundation in Victoria, joined forces with the three already mentioned. These four people worked together in close co-operation and harmony and were responsible for selecting and interesting prominent men and women to constitute the Board and Council of the Asthma Foundation of Victoria. It was due to their drive and administrative capacity that the Asthma Foundation of Victoria came into being in August 1963 and launched an appeal in April 1964 resulting in a net figure of £79,716.

Before the inauguration of the Foundation, office space was obtained in a building in Collins Street. Following the pattern of New South Wales, Mrs. Govan Cox and Mrs. Campbell manned that office in a voluntary capacity with the help of other honorary workers. They kept the office functioning for well over six months until the Appeal began when the office was moved to larger premises in St. Kilda Road where it remained until it was recently transferred to the Foundation's property at Kew.

The Victorian Foundation decided to allocate a sum of £15,000 per year over a five-year period to investigation and research into the causes and treatment of asthma. Four Grants-in-Aid were given as follows:-

- (1) Prince Henry Hospital
- (2) St. Vincent's Hospital
- (3) Baker Medical Research Institute
- (4) Royal Children's Hospital Research Foundation

Early in 1965 the Victorian Foundation took a bold step. It purchased a residence in Kew to be used for the joint purpose of administration and as an Advisory Centre, and at a later stage as a Rehabilitation Centre. It is their hope that this Centre will prove to be of invaluable help to those seeking advice, comfort and direction with their problems. The other States will watch with great interest the result of this venture.

In October 1964 a Medical Adviser was appointed to the Asthma Foundation of Victoria, his duties to include advising the Foundation on medical enquiries and publicity, and to act as a liaison between the Board and the Medical and Scientific Committee.

The Asthma Foundation of Victoria, in line with the other States, is directed by a Board which controls the administration and policy of the Foundation; a Medical Advisory Research Committee which advises the Foundation on its research and medical aspects; a Finance Committee which directs the financial policy, and an active Women's Committee whose main responsibility is that of fund raising and promotion.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA

In November, 1961, prior to the formation of the Asthma Foundation in N.S.W., Mrs. Schmidt and Mrs. Halliday heard of work being done in South Australia by an organisation known as the Asthmatic Children's Aid Incorporated. It was understood that the formation of the A.C.A. was for the dual purpose of carrying out treatment of asthmatic children and for the purpose of promoting research. In an effort to find out more about this organisation, a letter was sent to the Premier of South Australia who wrote giving the name of the Honorary Secretary of the Women's Auxiliary, Mrs. R. Munro Ford. The files in N.S.W. show contacts with South Australia early in 1962, with the Premier's Department, with Lady Playford and with Mrs. Munro Ford.

On 24th April, 1962, the President of the Asthma Foundation of N.S.W., Mr. Justice Hardie, wrote to Dr. Munro Ford along these lines: "The aims of our organisation, as you are no doubt aware, are closely related to the aims of your Foundation, except for the establishment of an overseas scholarship and working executives to advise and assist with needy asthmatic families."

From then on constant correspondence took place between the interested parties in N.S.W. and in S.A. as to what was being done and could be done for asthma sufferers. In June 1963 Mrs. Halliday received a letter from Dr. Munro Ford saying that the Council of the A.C.A. in S.A. had decided to alter and extend its constitution to enable the Asthma Foundation of South Australia to be created from the original body known as the Asthmatic Children's Aid Incorporated. And then, on July 11th 1963, Dr. Munro Ford wrote again: "I am happy to inform you that it has been resolved to establish an Asthma Foundation of South Australia in this State." It will require alteration of the constitution to bring us in line with you and Victoria as far as our ideals are concerned."

On 18th October 1963, Mr. Justice Hardie and Mrs. Halliday, representing N.S.W., and Mrs. E.J. Campbell, representing Victoria, were present at the official inauguration of the Asthma Foundation of South Australia.

Looking back over the history of the formation of the Asthma Foundation in South Australia, three names spring to mind as those who have played prominent parts in the establishment of a body concerned with the future and the welfare of asthma sufferers. First, Dr. Cyril Piper, without whose foresight and initiative the Asthmatic Children's Aid Incorporated would not have come into being; secondly, Mr. Alex Ramsay, the Foundation President of the A.C.A., and, thirdly, Dr. Munro Ford, who, upon the death of Dr. Piper, took over the responsibility of supervising and treating the asthmatic children within the Junior Red Cross Home in Adelaide.

In June 1965 the Foundation embarked upon a public appeal for funds for Post Graduate teaching facilities in the field of asthma, research and other programmes. The Lord Mayor of Adelaide launched the appeal, and the Premier of South Australia and the Chairman of the Federal Council of the Asthma Foundations in Australia were the guest speakers. The current President of the South Australian Foundation is the Hon. Sir Geoffrey Reed.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA

In May 1964, Mrs. Halliday visited Perth and during that visit asked Mrs. W.M. Barton to accept the responsibility for the formation of a Foundation in Western Australia. With the valued guidance of Sir Lance Brisbane, Dr. Janet Elder and Dr. H.G. Breidahl, the Foundation was officially incorporated on January 11th, 1965, approximately eight months after the initial approach had been made. Mrs. Barton assumed the office of Honorary Co-ordinator and it was due to her personal contacts and energy that the Foundation came into being in such a very short time.

In Western Australia, things proceeded in a most orderly fashion: the selection and appointment of the President, Sir Lance Brisbane, Councillors and Executive Committee, and a gradual promotion of the Foundation, its aims and objectives, and then the official launching of the appeal, "Operation Breathe Easy" which took place on 2nd September, 1965.

This appeal for \$100,000 was officially launched by the Premier, the Honourable David Brand, with Mrs. Halliday present, representing the Federal Council. At the launching the Premier handed to the President, Sir Lance Brisbane, a cheque for \$5,000 as part of the State Government's grant of \$10,000, and a further grant of \$5,000 was made by the Lotteries Commission.

The Women's Appeal Committee immediately went to work under the Presidency of Mrs. W.M. Barton, and are actively engaged in fund raising by way of luncheons, mannequin parades, etc.

Committees have been formed in 35 centres throughout the country areas and it is expected that substantial support for the appeal will be received from them.

The Councillors are fortunate to have the support of the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, members of the staff of the Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital, Princess Margaret Hospital for Children and other hospitals, and many people of consequence in Western Australia.

Money donated to the Foundation will be used as follows:-

1. To open Asthma Advisory Centres in main hospitals.
2. To open Hostels for asthma sufferers to enable them to get daily treatment etc.
3. Commence a Rehabilitation Programme.
4. Buy equipment for Asthma Centres.
5. Commence research into causes and treatment of asthma.

QUEENSLAND

In August, 1961, before the formation of the Foundation in New South Wales, Mrs. Schmidt of Sydney was in communication with Dr. E.H. Derrick of the Queensland Institute of Medical Research. This Institute, under the control of the Queensland Government was carrying out a programme of research into one aspect of asthma at an annual cost of \$7,000. They were, and still are, investigating allergens in the air and changes in atmospheric and climatic conditions and the effect of such allergens and changes on the asthma sufferer.

In July 1963 (on the suggestion of Dr. and Mrs. Munro Ford of S.A.) Mrs. Halliday wrote to Mrs. W.D.B. McGregor of Brisbane and asked her to assume the responsibility for the formation of a Foundation in Queensland. Mrs. McGregor accepted the challenge and in association with a leading allergist and leading members of the Brisbane community succeeded in establishing the Queensland Foundation at an Inaugural meeting on April 29, 1965 under the Chairmanship of Sir Charles Davidson.

After some months of organisational work by a Board of Directors, a Council, and a Medical Advisory Committee, the Appeal "Operation Breathe Easy" was launched by the Premier of Queensland, the Hon. G.F.R. Nicklin, at Parliament House, Brisbane, on October 11th, 1965 at which the Minister for Health, the Hon. S.T. Tooth announced the generous donation by the Queensland Government to the Foundation of \$10,000 over a five year period.

Following this launching, an intensive drive was carried out by hard working committees in Brisbane and suburbs and country areas culminating in a State-wide Telethon on November 19th and 20th. In this the TV stations of Channel 9 Brisbane, Maryborough, Rockhampton, Townsville and Toowoomba gave the Foundation tremendous support.

The magnificent response of the people of Queensland has enabled the Foundation to engage in a programme of research and treatment co-ordinated with the Federal Council of the Asthma Foundations in Australia, and everything possible is being done to aid the asthma sufferer.

TASMANIA

In February, 1964, Mrs. Halliday wrote to Dr. Paul Clarke of Hobart, inviting him to the first meeting of interstate representatives of the Asthma Foundations in Australia, which took place in May 1964.

Following that meeting, Dr. Clarke prepared a most comprehensive document concerning the future deployment of funds on a national level. He was most interested in the formation of a Foundation in Tasmania and suggested that Mrs. Halliday contact a number of prominent citizens in Tasmania who might be interested in taking the initial steps there. Letters were written to The Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, Alderman Basil Osborne, Mr. D. von Bibra, and others.

Since the initial approach was made to these people in September 1964, things have progressed slowly and surely. The Lord Mayor, Mr. von Bibra and Dr. Clarke have worked together in an effort to promote the formation of a Foundation in Tasmania, and on June 8th 1965 a Steering Committee was set up to take the first steps to incorporate the Asthma Foundation of Tasmania. It is understood the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Foundation will be registered shortly and the Foundation officially commenced to the public in January 1966.

NATIONAL BODY

Prior to, and since the inception of the Asthma Foundation of N.S.W., it has been the fervent hope of Mrs. Halliday that a national body would be formed so that co-operation and full liaison would be possible amongst research workers to ensure that there would be no duplication resulting in waste of the people's money, and researchers' time. As the Foundations were set up in each state, her efforts to bring this about increased, and with the constant encouragement and valuable assistance of Mr. Justice Hardie, a meeting of interstate representatives of the various Foundations was called in Sydney on 14th May 1964 when a Co-ordinating Committee was set up. When this meeting was held no Foundations existed in Queensland, Western Australia or Tasmania, although approaches had been made to interested people in those States.

On 10th February 1965 the first meeting of the Co-ordinating Committee of the Asthma Foundations in Australia was held in Sydney with the principal object of establishing a national body. As a result of this meeting, The Federal Council of the Asthma Foundations in Australia was formed. State Foundations remain autonomous and are equally represented on the Federal Council; the functions of the Council will be the collation and distribution of information, approaches to Commonwealth and overseas bodies, and the setting up of machinery to ensure that there is no duplication of effort in the research programmes undertaken or supported by State Foundations.

The Council will function and be administered from the various States in turn; the Foundation in the State in which the Secretariat is for the time being based, will provide the office-bearers for that period. The Secretariat will be in New South Wales for the first period and the office-bearers are:
